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Abstract

The 2022 Urban Food Systems Symposium was Sept. 26-28, 2022 at the historic Hotel Kansas City in Kansas City, Missouri. The theme was "Building Coalitions for a Changing World." The symposium brought together more than 200 community leaders, urban planners, not-for-profit administrators, educators, researchers, students and others interested in urban food systems to share and gain knowledge on how to build coalitions, adapt to a changing world and discuss how urban food systems contribute to these solutions. The symposium is held every two years.

The two-day symposium featured a keynote speaker, three invited speakers, 11 oral and two poster sessions. Each oral session featured four 15-minute presentations on related topics ranging from city planning and zoning for urban agriculture, food policy, and Black-led urban agriculture and its transformative local impact, to aquaponics as a solution to climate change, and more. Presentations were followed by 30-minutes of participant discussion and questions to further explore the session's topic and get to know the people working on similar issues in other parts of the U.S. and across the globe. The program book provides the full program of plenary talks, concurrent oral and poster sessions, for the 2020 UFSS.

Candace Rashada Mujahid - Rooted in Relationship

Pandora Thomas

Pandora Thomas is a passionate global citizen who works as a caregiver, teacher, farmer, designer and speaker. Her work emphasizes the benefits of applying ecological principles to social design and reconnecting humans to our non-human kin.

For the last 10 years her earth service has included being a carepartner for her mother who was diagnosed with Alzheimers; co-founding the Black Permaculture Network; working for 6 years with Toyota to design and serve as a coalition member of the Toyota Green Initiative; co-designing, teaching with and directing Pathways to Resilience-a permaculture and social entrepreneur training program that worked with men and women returning home after incarceration; working with the Urban Permaculture Institute in Marin City supporting a People's Planning Process; and working as an advisor, co-designer and facilitator with Women's Earth Alliance's Grassroots Accelerator Program. Her lifelong commitment to honoring ancestral legacies of earth stewardship and centering the contributions of people of African Ancestry in reclaiming our shared earth care journeys is culminating in her most recent gift to the planet, founding EARTHseed Permaculture Center and Farm, the first Afro Indigenous permaculture farm in Sonoma County. EARTHseed's farming and centers programming will elevate the earth stewarding contributions and legacy of peoples of African ancestry throughout the Diaspora.



Anu Rangarajan

Dr. Anu Rangarajan has been on the faculty of Horticulture at Cornell University since 1996. As a Fresh Market Vegetable Specialist, she conducts a grant-funded research and extension program focused on reduced tillage systems to improve soil health while maintaining crop quality and yields. Anu also directs the Cornell Small Farms Program (www.smallfarms.cornell.edu). Through collaborations with Extension as well as other nonprofit agriculture organizations, the Program provides online and face-to-face training targeting small-scale producers. She applied the lens of commercial small-scale farming to understand conditions that allow commercial urban small farms to thrive.

These research findings are published in "The Promise of Urban Agriculture." The findings are now being transformed into curricula for experienced growers seeking to farm in urban spaces as well as planners and policy makers interested in supporting urban agriculture development. She is also part of a team creating workforce development trainings for controlled environment agriculture. In her role as an Assistant Director of Cornell Cooperative Extension, she is working to strengthen engagement of and services to BIPOC farmers around NY and the Northeast.



Samina Raja

Dr. Samina Raja is a Professor of Urban and Regional Planning and the Associate Dean for Research and Inclusive Excellence at the University at Buffalo, the State University of New York. Her research focuses on the potential of food systems as a lever for social transformation, and the ways in which community-led planning and policy mediates this potential.

She is the founder and Director of the Food Systems Planning and Healthy Communities Lab and Co-Directs the Community for Global Health Equity. With community and academic partners, she currently leads an action-research initiative, Growing Food Policy from the Ground Up, to build the capacity of growers of color to shape urban agriculture policy (in Buffalo, NY and Minneapolis, MN). A larger, national-scale project Growing Food Connections focuses on the use of local government planning to strengthen community food systems. Her work outside of the US highlights the ways in which smallholder urban farmers in the Global South influence food sovereignty, particularly in cities experiencing protracted crises (Srinagar, Kashmir). Most recently, the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) published her (and co-authors') work on the role of local government planning in strengthening food systems in low- and middle-income countries.

A widely published scholar, Dr. Raja is the recipient of numerous awards including for her mentorship (2020 Distinguished Post Doc Mentor), community-engaged work (2016 Excellence in Community-University Engagement), and scholarship (2014 Dale Scholar).



Candace Rashada Mujahid

Candace Rashada-Mujahid brings over twenty years experience assisting in the development of successful grant proposals, as well as training and development for young adult and adult populations in transition from foster care, homelessness and incarceration. Her experience with City University of New York, City of New York Administration for Children's Services and New York State Office of Youth Services led to the creation and continued funding of programs that served transitioning public assistance recipients, youth leaving foster care as well as children in protective custody.

Since relocating to North Carolina, she has successfully written proposals for Community Success Initiative, a reentry community-based organization, as well as collaborated with other non-profits in the area that serve youth and adults. She currently serves as a board member of Communities in Partnership a community-rooted organization, invested, and operating in liberative practice and community accountability.

Mrs. Rashada-Mujahid currently serves as Program Director for Career Services and Human Resources Development/Workforce Development at Durham Technical Community College.

	Anu Rangarajan Bridging the Gap between Urban and Rural Farming Moderator: Candice Shoemaker In the study titled, "The Promise of Urban Agriculture," we found commercial urban small farms had many creative ways to earn income while delivering on multiple social, environmental and food sovereignty goals. As places that produce food, ideas and entrepreneurs, urban farms have repeatedly been shown to provide benefits that accrue to more people than just the surrounding neighbors. As an urban farm entrepreneur considers scaling up, however, they are faced with challenges of accessing more land and other essential farm resources. Rural places offer an opportunity to grow a farm business, but gaps in culture, diversity, farm practices and supportive networks can thwart the farmer's success. How do we go beyond bridging the gaps or rifts between urban and rural farming, to create the reciprocal, responsive and interdependent farm/food system we imagine? There are several important opportunities for urban farming that are under-developed yet have the potential to reframe all of US agriculture. How we see and understand agriculture's future can guide how we build urban-rural coalitions that bridge the rift and uplift urban farming.

9:00 a.m.	Invited speaker - The Tudor Ballroom (4th Floor) Samina Raja Extraction to Equity: Leveraging Urban Food Systems for Structural Transformation Moderator: Cary Rivard Public, private, and philanthropic solutions overlook the political and structural determinants of food inequities, an issue addressed by the speaker Dr. Samina Raja. This oversight was made especially clear in the wake of a mass shooting of grocery shoppers by a white supremacist in one of the very few supermarkets in a historically Black neighborhood in Buffalo, NY, on May 14, 2022. The shooter killed ten people, injured others, and retraumatized an entire community. The Buffalo massacre was a tragic mix of multiple forms of acute and chronic violence. The Black community responded rapidly and purposefully by taking care of its own, a common response in neighborhoods and communities historically neglected by public, private, and philanthropic actors. Black-led urban farms, food cooperatives, and organizations banded together to provide food and mental-health-related support, for example. Responses from outside the community to address food inequities focused primarily on short-term solutions, though, following community pressure, some also addressed structural reforms. The extent to which public policy transforms extractive food systems into equitable ones remains to be seen. The speaker will conclude with ideas for leveraging urban food systems for more equitable social transformation.
